- C we confess to you, Lord.
- P Our self-indulgent appetites and ways, and our exploitation of other people,
- C we confess to you, Lord.
- P Our anger at our own frustration, and our envy of those more fortunate than ourselves,
- C we confess to you, Lord.
- P Our intemperate love of worldly goods and comforts, and our dishonesty in daily life and work,
- C we confess to you, Lord.
- P Our negligence in prayer and worship, and our failure to commend the faith that is in us,
- C we confess to you, Lord.
- P Accept our repentance, Lord, for the wrongs we have done. For our blindness to human need and suffering, and our indifference to injustice and cruelty,
- C accept our repentance, Lord.

- P For all false judgments, for uncharitable thoughts toward our neighbors, and for our prejudice and contempt toward those who differ from us,
- C accept our repentance, Lord.
- P For our waste and pollution of your creation, and our lack of concern for those who come after us,
- C accept our repentance, Lord.
- P Restore us, good Lord, and let your anger depart from us.
- C Hear us, Lord, for your mercy is great. Amen.
- P Almighty God, you have created us out of the dust of the earth.

 May these ashes be a sign of our mortality and penitence,
 reminding us that only through the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ
 are we given eternal life; through the same Jesus Christ, your Son, our Lord.
- C Amen.

IMPOSITION OF ASHES

All who wish to receive the imposition of ashes are invited to come forward. The following words are spoken during the imposition: 'Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return.'

After all who desire ashes have received them, we stand for the conclusion of the confession.

- P Accomplish in us, O God, the work of your salvation,
- C that we may show forth your glory in the world.
- P By the cross and Passion of your Son, our Lord,
- C bring us with all your saints to the joy of his resurrection.
- P Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, does not desire the death of sinners, but rather that they may turn from their wickedness and live.

 Therefore we implore him to grant us true repentance and his Holy Spirit, that those things may please him which we do on this day, that the rest of our life may be pure and holy, and that at the last we may come to his eternal joy; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

FIRST READING: Isaiah 58:1–12

Shout out, do not hold back!

Lift up your voice like a trumpet!

Announce to my people their rebellion, to the house of Jacob their sins.

²Yet day after day they seek me and delight to know my ways, as if they were a nation that practiced righteousness and did not forsake the ordinance of their God; they ask of me righteous judgments, they delight to draw near to God.

BThen your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your healing shall spring up quickly; your vindicator shall go before you, the glory of the LORD shall be your rear guard.

⁹Then you shall call, and the LORD will answer;

you shall cry for help, and he will say, Here I am.

If you remove the yoke from among you,

the pointing of the finger, the speaking of evil,

¹⁰if you offer your food to the hungry

and satisfy the needs of the afflicted, then your light shall rise in the darkness and your gloom be like the noonday.

¹¹The LORD will guide you continually, and satisfy your needs in parched places, and make your bones strong; and you shall be like a watered garden, like a spring of water, whose waters never fail.

¹²Your ancient ruins shall be rebuilt; you shall raise up the foundations of many generations; you shall be called the repairer of the breach, the restorer of streets to live in.


SECOND READING: 2 Corinthians 5:20b–6:10

^{20b}We entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. ²¹For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God. ^{6:1}As we work together with him, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain. ²For he says, "At an acceptable time I have listened to you, and on a day of salvation I have helped you." ¹⁹"Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; ²⁰but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. ²¹For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

A brief silence.




OFFERTORY PRAYER

This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin.


Do this for the remembrance of me.







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What is Lent and why is it important?

Lent is a solemn religious observance in the Christian liturgical calendar commemorating the 40 days Jesus spent fasting in the desert, according to the Gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke, before beginning his public ministry, during which he endured temptation by Satan. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and ends at sundown on Holy Thursday. It's a period of preparation to celebrate the Lord's Resurrection at Easter. During Lent, many Christians seek the Lord in prayer by reading Sacred Scripture; serve by giving alms; and practice self-control through fasting. We are called to a true inner conversion of heart as we seek to follow Christ's will more faithfully. We recall the waters of baptism in which we were also baptized into Christ's death, died to sin and evil, and began new life in Christ. Many know of the tradition of fasting during Lent, but we are also called to practice self-discipline and fast in other ways throughout the season. Contemplate the meaning and origins of the Lenten fasting tradition. In addition, the giving of alms is one way to share God's gifts—not only through the distribution of money, but through the sharing of our time and talents.

Marking our foreheads with dust, we acknowledge that we die and return to the earth. At the same time, the dust traces the life-giving cross indelibly marked on our foreheads at baptism. While we journey through Lent to return to God, we have already been reconciled to God through Christ. We humbly pray for God to make our hearts clean while we rejoice that "now is the day of salvation." Returning to our baptismal call, we more intentionally bear the fruits of mercy and justice in the world.
