In Holy Communion the crucified and risen Christ is present, giving his true body and blood as food and drink. All are invited to the table where Christ himself is host.

As We Gather

The final three days of Lent are often referred to as the Triduum. A triduum is a three-day period of prayer, usually in preparation for an important festival. The final three days of Lent and Holy Week, referred to as the Paschal Triduum, leads us into the feast of feasts, the Resurrection of our Lord on Easter.

Though chronologically three days, the Paschal Triduum is liturgically a single event revealing for us the unity of Christ's Paschal Mystery. For this reason there is no benediction on Maundy Thursday or Good Friday, for the Triduum isn't complete until the Easter Eucharist is celebrated.

Father of mercies and God of all consolation,

come to the aid of your people, turning us away from our sin to live for you alone. Give us the power of your Holy Spirit,

that we may attend to your Word, confess our sins, receive your forgiveness,

and grow into the fullness of your Son Jesus Christ, our Lord and our Redeemer.

- P Let us make confession to God.

Silence is kept for reflection and self-examination.

- P We pray,
- C Almighty God, merciful Father:

We are humble and penitent sinners, desperately in need of your boundless mercy and the fullness of your grace. We confess to you all our sins and iniquities with which we have offended you and those around us. We readily admit that we are deserving of punishment, and are fully aware of the consequences our sin brought upon Jesus and our world.

For the sake of the suffering and death of your Son, Jesus Christ,

be gracious and merciful to us weak and sinful beings;

forgive our sins, grant us your Holy Spirit for the amendment of our sinful lives, and bring us to life everlasting. Amen.

- P In the mercy of Almighty God, Jesus Christ was given to die for us and, for his sake, God forgives us all our sins.
 Through the Holy Spirit, God cleanses us and gives us the power to proclaim the mighty acts of the One who called us out of darkness into his marvelous light.
 As a called and ordained minister of the Church of Christ and by his authority, I therefore declare to you the entire forgiveness of all your sins, in the name of the Father, and of the [‡] Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Write this commandment in our hearts, and give us the will to serve others as he was servant of all; through your Son, Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

FIRST READING: Exodus 12:1–14

The LORD said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: ²This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. ³Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. 4If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbor in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. ⁵Your lamb shall be without blemish, a year-old male; you may take it from the sheep or from the goats. You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month; then the whole assembled congregation of Israel shall slaughter it at twilight. 7They shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. ⁸They shall eat the lamb that same night; they shall eat it roasted over the fire with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. ⁹Do not eat any of it raw or boiled in water, but roasted over the fire, with its head, legs, and inner organs. ¹⁰You shall let none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn. 11'This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the LORD. ¹²For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the LORD. ¹³The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt. ¹⁴This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the LORD; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.





Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." ²⁶For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

HOLY GOSPEL: John 13:1–17, 31b–35

P The Holy Gospel according to St. John, the thirteenth chapter.

C Glory to you, O Lord.

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. ²The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper ³Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, ⁴got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. ⁵Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. ⁶He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" ⁷Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." ⁸Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." ⁹Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" ¹⁰Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." ¹¹For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean."

¹²After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? ¹³You call me Teacher and Lord—and you are right, for that is what I am. ¹⁴So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also


ought to wash one another's feet. ¹⁵For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. ¹⁶Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. ¹⁷If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them. ³¹Jesus said, "Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. ³²If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. ³³Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, "Where I am going, you cannot come." ³⁴I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. ³⁵By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.


For thine is the kingdom, and the power,

COMMUNION





STRIPPING OF THE ALTAR

Jesus' words to his disciples in the Garden of Gethsemane, Matthew 26:36-42, "My soul is very sorrowful, even unto death; remain here and watch with me." are sung during the stripping of the altar as a reminder of Christ's deep sorrow at his humiliation and suffering.



(7:00 pm) Stay with me, remain here with me, watch and pray.

Verses:

- 1. Stay here and keep watch with me. Watch and pray!
- 2. Watch and pray not to give way to temptation.
- 3. The spirit is eager, but the flesh is weak.
- 4. My heart is nearly broken with sorrow. Remain here with me, stay awake and pray.
- 5. Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass me by.
- 6. Father, if this cannot pass me by without my drinking it, your will be done.

At this time, our remembrance of the Triduum is suspended. Our service of the Holy Days will continue tomorrow. In keeping with the solemnity of this night and in consideration of one another **we depart in silence**. Those who wish to remain in the sanctuary for a time of meditation and prayer are welcome to do so.
